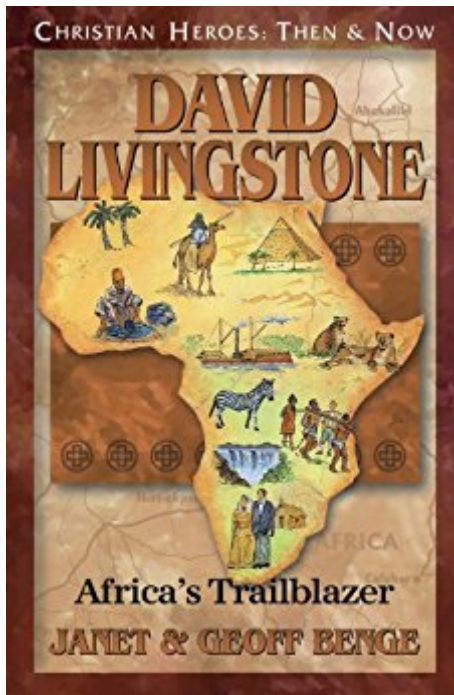


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David Livingstone: Africa's Trailblazer (Christian Heroes: Then & Now)

This is a great series that can be enjoyed by young children and adults. I used them as part of the training for a short term missions campaign. Each of the fourteen team members read a different biography in this series and then reported to the rest of the team. It was reminder that the training

topics we were learning were relevant and lived out by the faithful and fruitful missionaries introduced by this series of biographies. For many of the team this was their first introduction to reading Christian biography and they loved it!

Positives of this series:

- 1) Great introductory overviews of the lives and ministries of the individuals.
- 2) Basic reading level for an increasingly illiterate culture.
- 3) Short enough to be read quickly in a culture with an increasingly short attention span.
- 4) Available in Kindle and audio book for the technologically inclined.
- 5) Well written and holds your attention without being exaggerated and exploitative.
- 6) Chapters are short and can easily be read to children at bedtime or by adults on lunch breaks.

Negatives of this series:

- 1) Due to their brevity and target audience the series does not deal with the more negative aspects of an individual's struggles with sin and the weaknesses in their personality as sinners saved by grace.
- 2) Does not come across as hagiography (so idealizing the person that it borders on idolatry) but these introductions are not the place to get the full picture of these godly but imperfect champions for God. Instead they are great springboards to more extensive biographies that deal with the fuller picture of these heroic but very human Christ followers.

David Livingstone's story is unbelievable. An adventure you expect to see in fiction. As amazing as he was, we still see the battles he faces with regards to physical and emotional suffering. A very real account that the reader can sympathize with. His zeal and passion for mission is up there among the greatest and I am humbled and inspired. A well documented biography that also gives much visibility to colonial history in Africa during Livingstone's lifespan. Great read

This is a concise form of the missionary David Livingston. It tells the main facts about David being more of an explorer than a true missionary. There are 3 ways a minister, preacher, priest, or missionary can fail his duties. He will fail one or more of the 3 G's: Glory, Gold, or Girls. It is for sure Livingstone wanted a lot of glory. He did not really do his family justice either. But England loved him because of all the glory they got from his adventures and claiming things for the country. I had heard of David Livingstone for many years, but I did not know some of the details until I read this book. The book will give you a good outline of his life.

This was the first book of this Christian Heroes series I read to my kids (6 and 9), and it definitely held their attention. It was quite good talking about Livingstone's early life. Maybe that's the part that is most interesting to kids, I don't know. As an adult, I was a little disappointed that this book did not explain more the significance of David Livingstone's life. I had to fill in some details from what I

remembered in school about his amazing last journey (after he died). I think it does not portray just how much his African companions loved him, and how deep his influence among the Africans was (and how much of a contrast it was to the other explorers/conquerors who gave the Europeans a bad name). It did not say much about Livingstone's far-reaching influence on his countrymen, either--rethinking the white man's burden, his passion to end slavery, and his ideas about how opening up the areas to trade could help wipe it out. It may have mentioned these things in passing, but these things were so important in his life. Nor did it talk much about his uneasy relationship with the slavers themselves when he got in trouble on his missions, and I think it downplays his failures. In fact, all of his later years in this book are mostly a blur (this is often true of most of the books in this series, even when the later years were extremely important; it feels like the authors just got tired, and realized they had to end soon). As I said, though, it certainly held my kids' attention, and I'm not at all sorry I bought it. I'm not aware of anything else that's better, especially for the intended audience.
