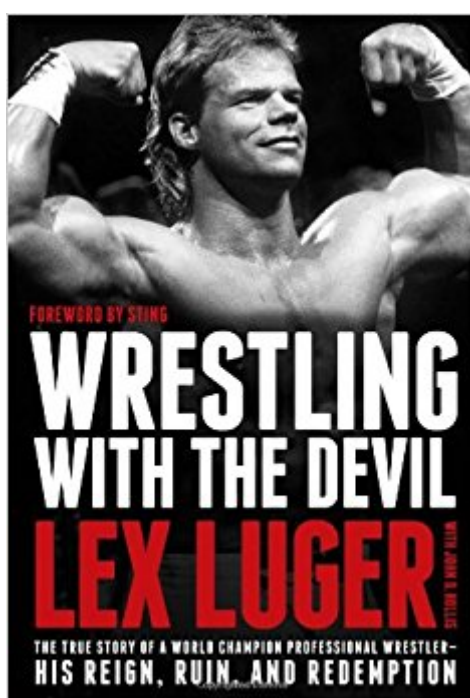

I decided to order this book on somewhat of a whim: I really just wanted an easy read that would kill a lot of time. I didn't kill so much time as I read it in its entirety in less than 12 hours, as the book is not that long, but it is still substantial and has some climactic moments which Luger describes in detail. I'm not quite sure if the book is ghost-written, but it nevertheless is written in a fairly simple, straightforward manner. Interspersed throughout the book are lines that signify some end to a specific thought. It is also supposed to weave together and create a theme for each chapter. The end-result is a book that is very light and easy to follow as far as the writing goes. Luger's life is

basically the archetypal fast living, and fast downward spiral that many celebrities seem to manifest--and later write about. Luger's saving grace is Jesus, a story that we've heard from many others who lived a so-called life of sin---drugs, booze, women, infidelity etc.Unfortunately, although Lex Luger talks about his working relationship with certain wrestlers who are no longer with us--such as the British Bulldog and Mr. Perfect, he does not talk about the recent trend of ex-wrestlers dying from drug overdoses or heart attacks that might be linked to steroid abuse. I felt this was a significant drawback to the book.But Luger is deeply personal in the book about how his character had evolved over the years, and he holds nothing back when he describes his pinnacle moments and some of his lowest moments. It's actually a somewhat inspirational read, and he deserves credit for that. I'd recommend this book to someone who is not only a wrestling fan but would like to hear a deeply personal story of a man's incredible life, and his resurgence.

This book was a little disappointing. I was hoping he would've talked more about his rise to wrestling fame, the egos and challenges he faced, the spectacle of being a professional wrestler. But instead, the stories were short and gave few details. The book was mostly about his life before and after wrestling. Not about the sport he's most famous for. Lex Luger had several opportunities to straighten his life out,but the book followed a near typical case of addiction. I'm glad he's doing better, but at times it sounded "preachy".

This is,without a doubt, one of the most uplifting and inspirational books I have ever read. I was interested in reading it because I had been a long time fan (having watched him wrestle, on TV, on many occasions). When he "disappeared", I, like the rest of my family, had wondered what had happened to him. After watching him give an interview and talk about his book, I knew it was one I really wanted to read . The book is extremely well written and very eye-opening and flows smoothly. I, literally, could not put it down ! I highly recommend it for wrestling, and non-wrestling fans alike !

It seems to be a clear cut case of a man that is overly in love with himself to a man that is brought back down to reality. The book describes the many stages of Lex Luger's life. If you enjoy reading wrestling books or short stories of redemption, then I would highly recommend reading this book. It does completely gloss over some pretty critical moments in Lex's career (both wrestling and football), but it gives you enough to get the picture. I also wish there would have been more detail given to the backstage dynamics of his wrestling years, but in the end that is not the primary focus of this book. Lex's story is one of grace and redemption, so if you need some good perspective on life...go ahead and pick this one up.
