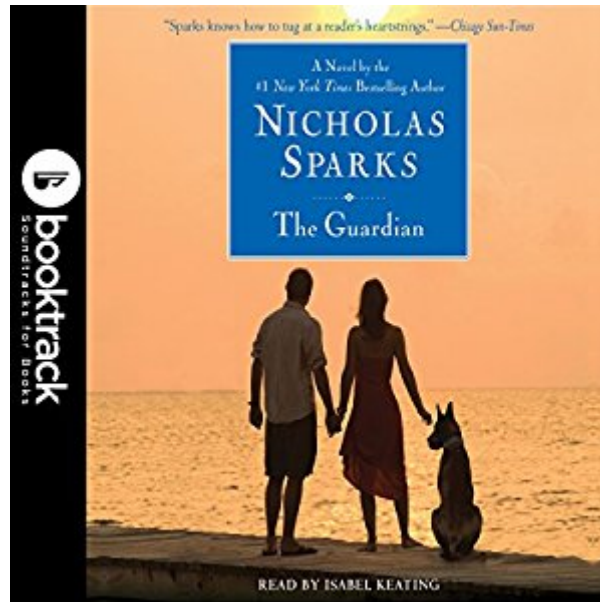




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The Guardian: Booktrack Edition

As the pages turn, we find out that something may be amiss and so the suspense begins. In true Sparks' fashion, there is a twist and a mystery. Although, not my favorite from this author, he does a good job bringing this story to life.
